One significant change this year is the implementation of the new residential demand charge, which began with January bills. This charge is designed to fairly distribute costs and help ensure accounts with higher energy demand are not subsidized by those with lower demand. It's important to emphasize this adjustment



allows us to keep facility charges and kilowatt-hour rates stable, even as we face rising costs from Bonneville Power Administration and increasing material and transportation expenses.

We understand changes like this can raise questions, and our team is here to help. Don't hesitate to reach out with questions or for assistance—our goal is to make this transition as seamless as possible. We have also provided tools and resources on our website to help you better understand and manage your energy use.

Additionally, we're focusing on critical infrastructure and wildfire mitigation projects this year.
